## **Hunter's Corner**



See that face? Anyone with a dog will recognize the "I'm starving—you haven't fed me in hours—why can't I have what you're having?" face. Unfortunately, when Hunter was going through heartworm treatment he got pretty much anything he wanted. Far too much sympathy for the difficult route he was having to take.

The result? Hunter is too heavy—although we try not to fat shame him, we have been known to call him Pogo at times.

Extra weight on a dog creates a much greater strain on both their joints/musculoskeletal system as well as on their internal organs.

Just like people, dogs who are overweight experience health risks such as diabetes, cardiopulmonary disease and renal problems. There's nothing good about feeding your dog too much except for the brief moment of making them happy. It's much more of the "more harm than good" behaviour.

How can you tell if your dog is overweight? Try to feel your dog's ribs. Is there so much tissue over them that you can't really feel them? If you look at your dog from the side, is there a visible "tuck" at the abdomen? Can you see a waistline if you view your dog from above. Chances are if your dog looks like a loaf of bread from the top he could stand to lose a few pounds. It will make him happier and healthier.

How can you help your dog maintain or reduce weight?

- Feed your dog at structured times during the day. Don't just fill his bowl and let him graze willy-nilly.
- Use a measuring cup for his food. Your eyes are likely deceiving you, and you're feeding too much.
- Watch the number of treats you're giving to your dog. Treats have calories, and just like your junk food treats are not likely the most healthy thing to eat.
- Increase exercise. It will be good for both of you!
- Lastly, make sure you don't associate food with love. Your dog will be healthier and happier and will likely live a longer life if he's at a proper weight. And he'll love you just as much!

This creampuff is mostly confident and easygoing, but he does have some separation anxiety. When he is in his crate he will bark and cry but eventually settles

down. After an extended period of time he may chew or tear things around his crate.

Tank had a heavy hookworm load upon arrival, and his digestive system has been a bit fussy. He is currently on a gastrointestinal recovery plan involving special food and medication. This plan is soon done, and we hope Tank will be back to normal. If his digestive system is still fussy, he will need to carry on with his food and an inexpensive medication.

Tank's ideal home would be with an active family who will give him lots of exercise and stimulation. He is eager to please, and maybe a tad rambunctious but a quick reminder to calm down helps him to settle.

Tank's foster family said the following about a recent social visit:



"Tank got to attend a bonfire party...and he did AMAZING. He was offleash in a new space, interacting with 30+ people and three new dogs who were all bigger than him and he loved it. He met everyone and quickly figured out how each person was willing to engage with him...he figured out how far away he needed to stay without much input from us. And, during all that, he was still coming when we called and listening to commands from whoever he was hanging out with. I'm beyond impressed."

This dog is an absolute gem. Tank has been neutered, microchipped, and his vaccinations are up to date. The adoption fee for Tank is \$600.

# Cats Available for Adoption Jasper




Jasper is a male, black, short-haired cat born in 2019.
