Hunter's Corner



After volatile spring, we're finally heading into the warmth of summer. Hunter seems not to recognize when he is too hot – he'd be perfectly happy following that new scent that is soooo delicious!! We therefore have to be careful that he comes in when it's just too hot to walk. Learn to recognize the signs!

- The signs of heatstroke are heavy panting, seeking shade and an overall change in behaviour may be a sign of overheating.
- There are some dogs at greater risk in the heat. Dogs who are short-muzzled such as Bulldogs, Boxers, and Pugs cannot pant as efficiently as other breeds, and may have a harder time keeping cooler.
- When you notice the signs of heat stroke, bring them into a cooler environment with access to fresh water. Wet them with water and place them in front of a fan.
- If your dog continues to excessively pant and drool, or if they exhibit other symptoms such as difficulty breathing, vomiting, confusion or collapse, they should be taken to a vet as these signs could indicate life-threatening heat stroke.

How to prevent heatstroke?

- Avoid strenuous exercise and limit activity to cooler times of the day
- Keep indoors in extreme temperatures
- Offer frequent water breaks

The last point seems so logical: never, ever leave you dog unattended in a car. Opening a window will NOT keep a car cool. It is not unknown for a car interior to increase by 10 to 15 degrees Celsius in less than an hour. Don't let your dog become a statistic!

Foster Profile

If anyone has adopted a cat or kitten from Home Again, it is very likely that you have met our extraordinary volunteer Mary! I sat down with Mary to discuss fostering and specifically the cat side of Home Again's rescue.

- 1. How did you become involved with Home Again? My dog had died, and I was grief-stricken for the better part of a year. I decided to foster to help with my sadness, and the very first dog I fostered was the same breed. Over the years I have fostered 25 dogs.
- 2. Did you ever have a foster fail? Each dog that I fostered took about a month before they were ready for adoption. They would need to be socialized, spayed or neutered and vaccinated, and I learned so much about each dog. After about 1 ½ years of fostering, I met Trixie and she was perfect!!
- 3. How did you become involved in Caturday, the day when we bring kittens available for adoption to Pet Valu? I was looking for a way to serve the community on an entry level. Home Again had many volunteers in the Caturday program, and I began to take over the program. There's an altruistic benefit to being an advocate for the cats who cannot speak, and over the years I've seen approximately 125 cats adopted from the program.
- 4. Do you have a story about a specific cat? In March we received a telephone call from a man who was devastated because he was moving into long-term care and could take his adult cats with him. Home Again picked them up and both were adopted, one to our Cats for Seniors program which pairs a needy older cat with a senior. The senior pays no adoption fee, and Home Again commits to finding a good home for the cat if it outlives the senior.

- 5. What advice would you give to someone adopting their first cat? Pick a sanctuary room where the cat can be left alone and quiet with the door closed. Visit the cat, but only let it out when you can see by its body language that the cat has acclimatized.
- 6. What's the most important work that Home Again does for cats and kittens? Making sure that a foster cat is matched with the correct family is important, but even more important is preventing litters of unwanted kittens. Home Again assists in two ways: helping individuals to find less ways to have their cats spayed or neutered, and the TNR (Trap/Neuter/Return) program.

In our Ontario area, less expensive spaying and neutering services can be booked at the Southeastern Ontario Spay Neuter clinic in Trenton. Since Bancroft and the area only have full service vet hospitals, the Trenton clinic is a much more affordable option. Appointments can be booked at www.spayneuterontario.com.

The TNR program reduces the number of kittens born in the wild and improves the lives of older feral cats. Interested individuals can take a course through the Toronto Humane society which provides information on how to humanely care for feral cats. You are then provided a certificate which can be used for no-cost spaying and neutering at the Toronto Humane Society. More information can be seen at www.communitycats.ca.

Lastly, Mary reiterated that she is proud to be a part of an organization that will give a refund within 30 days for a cat that just isn't the right fit in the household. Buying a kitten or cat off a non-rescue site can often result in an unhappy family, and an unhappy cat that is dumped somewhere rather than being in a loving home.

Mary concluded her interview by saying that adoption days make her really happy, because if families are happy with their choice, the kittens are going to a nurturing home and will therefore themselves be happy!

She said when an adult cat is adopted, she is happy to the point of tears. Most Bancroft residents want kittens, and will join a waiting list to get one. Cats linger in their foster homes and so it's a special day when they're adopted!




















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
Happy Adoption Tales!
